

WATER QUALITY



On July 1 we sampled four locations for zebra mussel veligers, the microscopic larvae of zebra mussels that are normally present when the water temperatures reach the 70s. During the sampling, water temperatures at three feet below the surface were measured between 73 and 75 degrees F. We sampled in Little Cedar, near the public access, the very east end of the lake in Sunset Bay and the very north end near the outflow from our lake to the Mississippi.

Please make sure if you are installing a used dock or boatlift that it has been out of the water for the required 21 days. Minnesota law requires docks and boatlifts to be out of the water for at least 21 days before putting them in another body ofwater.

We get a variety of information



that has been compiled by the public access monitors' reports. Example...lakes with AIS that were "last visited" before entering Cedar included Mille Lacs, Minnetonka, Big Sandy, Serpent, Clearwater, Pokegama, Bay, Alexander, Gull and the Mississippi River. In addition, above is a chart showing what watercraft types that were launched in 2018.

Land Preservation

As discussed at the 2018 and recently the 2019 CLC Annual Meetings, we worked with the Northern Waters Land Trust to apply for Lessard - Sams Outdoor Heritage Council Funds to acquire 46 acres and its 1,500 feet of shoreline just north of the public landing and existing Wildlife Management Area (WMA) outlined in blue below. This property will attach to the adjacent DNR Wildlife Management Area, which is 54 acres, making the preserved area a total of about 100 acres. The biological quality of this stretch of shoreline, the fact that it is adjacent to an existing WMA, a very unique opportunity to acquire the intact parcel and our successful effort to secure 90% of the funding from the Outdoor Heritage Council make this an incredible opportunity.

To complete this transaction we need to raise about \$70,000 as a part of our local match of 10%. The grant from the Lessard - Sams Outdoor Heritage Council Funds will provide the other approximately \$650,000 necessary to complete the purchase. We have a



start at fund raising but need your help to get to the target. Please help us raise the money to preserve this shoreline and the acreage that is within the watershed of our lake.

Biologists and fisheries specialists have identified this shoreline as very sensitive to development as it is in a very natural condition right now. This area of lake shore scored very high on the DNR scoring system – the highest of any parcel yet evaluated with the DNR Aquatic Management Area Prioritization System. If we do not complete the purchase, it has the potential to be developed into ten additional lakeshore parcels increasing the density of development on Cedar Lake, if sold to a developer.

All donations for the protection and preservation of this parcel are tax deductible, charitable donations. Money donated is kept in a segregated account by the CLC until the transaction closes. If closing does not happen due to us not meeting the fundraising goal, the funds will be returned to donors. Please contact me to discuss how you can help or if you have any questions. CITIZEN'S LAKE MONITORING PROGRAM

With summer comes the work of our great water clarity volunteers officially known as the "Citizens Monitoring Program". Our ten water clarity stewards equipped with their Secchi discs are launching their canoes, kayaks, fishing boats and pontoons to measure the clarity of Cedar twice a month from June until August. The work of this team is very important and we collect data allowing us to monitor the quality of Cedar Lake over the years.

Last year the team did a great job in collecting our measurements which we summited to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency for permanent retention and analysis. Last year's results on Cedar show the continuance of a recent trend of increasing clarity of our lake (approximately 10'). Early reports from our volunteers this year are also quite encouraging.

While all ten of our measuring sites are currently covered on Cedar Lake, if you are interested in joining us in this program, contact me for future opportunities.

MEMBERSHIP

Close your eyes and visualize your favorite outdoor place. Hold it in your mind. What does it look like? How does it make you feel? Who is there with you? What close relationships do you associate with this place? For many of us this place is Cedar Lake.

Perhaps it's the scent of pine, the quaking aspens in the breeze, the myriad wildlife, loon calls echoing through the night, a fish on the end of the line, the sound of waves timelessly lapping against the shoreline, a bracing morning plunge from the dock, thunder as a storm rolls in, the splendor of today's sunset or the promise of tomorrow's sunrise, gazing with wonder at the Milky Way and beyond, or (on those special nights) the Northern Lights. Perhaps it's our families, grandparents, parents, or children. Maybe it's not one but all of these things.

The question is this. Is this place worth preserving and protecting, protecting for nature's sake, protecting for our sake, protecting for those who will follow?



If you agree that it is, please continue to support our Conservancy. **Better yet, convince your neighbors to do the same!** Currently there are 437 properties on Cedar Lake and 186 Conservancy members on record during 2018. Our membership is strong and growing, but it is critical that we gather all the support we can. Purchasing a gift membership for a child or grandchild is a great way to support the Conservancy. We also revere memorial contributions honoring loved ones who held Cedar Lake close to their hearts.

You may wonder if the Conservancy's work matters. It does! Here are but a few examples of how the Conservancy's work is protecting the lake's environment:

- The Conservancy is in the process of coordinating acquisition of 46 acres of environmentally sensitive land near the public access. This land will be deeded over to the Minnesota DNR for stewardship which will protect that portion of the shoreline for generations to come thereby enhancing the lake's natural beauty, wildlife habitat, and water quality.
- The Conservancy coordinates and participates in funding the cost of an inspector at the public access. This person is there to educate lake users about invasive species and to serve as first line of defense against invasive species gaining a toehold in our lake.
- Throughout the summer Conservancy volunteers scout for Eurasian milfoil, zebra mussels and other invasive species. Early detection is critical as are the close working relationships that the Conservancy has established with the DNR and County Conservation Districts. In the event invasive species are detected, we have a very short window to react before the problem spreads and is no longer manageable. Timing and funding will be critical, which is why we have established an AIS Fund (Aquatic Invasive Species). We're far more likely to secure the DNR and County support we will need if we stand ready with funds and demonstrated commitment to doing our part to protect the lake.

AITKIN AREA FISHERIES

Our goals for Cedar are to 1) maintain walleye abundance at or above three fish per gill net lift, 2) maintain muskellunge abundance at catch rates above 0.15/net in spring trap net surveys and 3) maintain largemouth bass catch rates in spring nighttime electrofishing greater than 20 fish per hour with preferred size fish (15") sampled.

We currently stock walleye fingerlings annually at one pound per littoral acre of standard sized Mississippi strain stock (20/lb.) and stock Leech Lake strain muskellunge fingerlings annually at one fish per littoral acre (405 fish). We conduct fisheries assessments every three years with a full resurvey every fourth assessment (next in 2026) and population assessments in the other survey years (next in 2020). We include spring muskellunge trap net assessments every other assessment (next in 2023) and include near shore sampling components every other assessment. As usual, we conduct temperature and dissolved oxygen profiles in August to monitor tullibee (northern cisco) habitat regularly, as staff time permits.

One minor change we made to walleye management was to continue with annual fingerling stocking of walleye (1 lb./littoral acre), but also allow for surplus stocking of older life stages of walleye in fall, up to 1.5 lbs./littoral acre for yearlings or adults not more than once every other year. This essentially gives us the option to stock large walleye in the lake IF and WHEN they are available. In case you're wondering, "littoral acres" is the amount of acreage in a lake that is 15' deep or less and is how we determine the amount of fish to stock in a lake. Our data shows that walleye catches over the last three surveys have been around two per net, which isn't bad by any means. But, we would like to get it back up over three, which is why we made this addition to the plan.




